Braveheart is part of the Progressive Beef program, which includes third-party audits for humane treatment and sustainability. EXPLORING OPPORTUNITIES TO ENHANCE OUR COURT FACILITIES

As part of our ongoing commitment to improving the member experience and making thoughtful use of our recreational spaces, the Buildings and Grounds Committee and I have been exploring ideas to expand and diversify our court facilities at the Isles Yacht Club. One concept under consideration is converting one of our four existing Har-Tru Tennis courts into a multi-sport court—a flexible space that could accommodate either one full Tennis court or four Pickleball courts.

This idea comes as we look for ways to serve the growing range of interests within our membership. Pickleball, in particular, has seen tremendous growth across the country and among clubs like ours. Its appeal spans generations, offering a fun, social, and accessible way to stay active. By providing facilities for both Tennis and Pickleball, we could make the Isles Yacht Club even more welcoming to new members and more engaging for current ones.

RESPECTING OUR TENNIS TRADITION

Of course, we understand that our Har-Tru courts are cherished by many members who have built lasting friendships and traditions around tennis here. Any change that affects those courts must be carefully weighed. While converting one court would slightly reduce total Har-Tru capacity, three courts would remain for regular play, tournaments, and lessons. The goal would be to enhance—not diminish—our Tennis program, while introducing opportunities for additional recreational play through Pickleball.

EXPLORING OTHER OPTIONS

At the same time, we're also exploring the possibility of developing a joint-use court on adjacent property. This could allow for expanded use without altering existing Har-Tru courts. In addition, we are evaluating the feasibility of creating two Pickleball-only courts adjacent to the current Tennis complex, providing a dedicated space for the sport while keeping all four Tennis courts intact.

SMART STEWARDSHIP AND FORWARD PLANNING

Whichever direction we take, cost, maintenance, and member satisfaction will remain at the forefront of our decision-making. Har-Tru courts require ongoing upkeep and water management, while a hard-surface option would help reduce long-term maintenance costs. We want to ensure that any investment we make benefits the entire membership and supports the Club's long-term sustainability.

These ideas are still in the exploratory phase, and member input is very important as we evaluate the best path forward. FLEET CAPTAIN REPORT

With thanks to Jeff & Anne Peltier for their input over a glass at the Clearwater FCYC event this month, I offer the following article with some ideas and suggestions for short haul cruises. The theme of this article is based on the predicate that IYC is well situated to perpetuate short haul cruises — let's call them "lunch cruises." For purposes of this article, a "lunch cruise" is one in which you can depart in the morning for a leisurely trip for lunch, and return safely home in the same day. The great thing about lunch cruising is that the boating is not challenging, the venues are varied, and it is a perfect option for smaller boats.

Living in the Charlotte Harbor area, we are afforded many options for lunch cruising, with most destinations in and via protected waters. The classes of destinations for consideration are: safe anchorages, private resorts, and FCYC yacht clubs.

Perhaps the most popular anchorage is Pelican Bay, situated adjacent to Cayo Costa and just off the Intracoastal Waterway, near Boca Grande pass. This well protected bay is a great spot to drop an anchor and enjoy an afternoon meal. It is also one of the closest of the destinations on this list.

With respect to private resorts, there are many options for a lunch cruise. Miller's Dockside and Eagle Grill, near Boca Grande is also a nearby option. Probably the most famous and popular of these choices is Cabbage Key located in Pine Island Sound. With an old Florida vibe, interesting history and walking trails, everyone should visit at least once. Two additional choices in this group include Tween Waters and South Seas Plantation, both located on Captiva Island.

Of the FCYC Clubs, there are several within short boating distance. At only two miles distance, of course, Charlotte Harbor Yacht Club is the closest. Straying just a bit further, the options include Venice YC, to the north, easily reachable via the ICW. To the south, Captiva YC (Pine Island Sound) and St. Charles YC, near the entrance to the Caloosahatchee River, are within a reasonable distance.

In conclusion, we have many choices of nearby destinations for lunch cruising, via protected waters. Whether you want to drop anchor and enjoy a home-made sandwich, experience old Florida charm, or dine in one of the more formal FCYC club dining rooms, the choices are plentiful.



While you may be familiar with the 2017 film *The Man Who Invented Christmas*, the story behind Charles Dickens and his celebrated work deserves wider recognition.

Charles Dickens is considered one of the foremost English authors, with fifteen novels, all of which have remained continuously in print. Despite this enduring legacy, by 1843 Dickens faced diminished popularity, critical disrepute, and financial difficulty. Confronting possible bankruptcy, he even contemplated abandoning fiction writing altogether.

During a six-week period preceding Christmas, Dickens authored a short book with the intention of alleviating his debts. After it was rejected by his publishers, Dickens resolved to self-publish using his limited resources.

Contrary to his concerns, the release of *A Christmas Carol* generated immediate acclaim; the initial printing sold out within four days, and subsequent editions were equally successful. The widespread adaptation of the story for the stage (and later in film) expanded its audience substantially.

Today, the narrative of Ebenezer Scrooge's transformation following visits from the spirits of Christmas Past, Present, and Yet to Come is universally recognized. However, A Christmas Carol did more than restore Dickens' reputation and financial standing; it invigorated a holiday that had lapsed into relative obscurity.

Christmas was a minor holiday, markedly less significant than Easter. The December 25 date, lacking direct biblical reference, was observed quietly, if at all.

This changed following the extraordinary reception of *A Christmas Carol*, which both renewed enthusiasm for the holiday and encouraged concern for the less fortunate. Having experienced poverty and child labor firsthand due to his father's imprisonment for debt, Dickens was committed to highlighting the hardships faced by the poor, especially children, many of whom lacked access to education and resorted to labor or crime.

Dickens believed fervently in self-improvement through education. In *A Christmas Carol*, Dickens employed overt allegory to advocate for societal enlightenment, aiming not merely to entertain but to inform and elevate the public consciousness.

The character of Scrooge remains a symbol of miserliness, yet his dramatic transformation exemplifies Dickens' belief in personal redemption and the possibility of change. I agree with those that attribute the modern celebration of Christmas to Dickens, though not in the context of modern commercialism. Rather, Dickens depicted the holiday as an occasion for generosity and goodwill rather than material excess.

In one brief work, he revitalized a neglected holiday. Over 150 years later, *A Christmas Carol* continues to uplift readers annually, serving as a reminder of the enduring importance of kindness, compassion, and community.

The IYC Sailing Club provides numerous ways to get out on the water including going out with the Race Committee on support boats or the Committee boat. Also, the Race Committee is always looking for local power boat owners to help with race support. Another popular option is the Wednesday afternoon Casual Practice Racing series (aka CPR), which involves the IYC boats and Harbor 20 sailors from around the area. Novices are welcome as each boat that goes out will have an experienced sailor aboard.

The three IYC owned sailboats, Clipper, Crafty Lady, and FWB II are for all members, not just racers, and can be checked out for a sail by qualified members anytime they have not been reserved. Qualification is how IYC ensures the person checking out a Club boat has the knowledge and ability to safely set up, sail, and return the boat. Qualification does not require members to be sailing experts or racers. Crew and guests aboard the IYC boats do not need to be qualified.

The IYC Racing Season is off to an excellent start. As of this article, two of the five Fall Racing Series events have been completed. At this time last year, many boats were still not in the water, and no races were held due the effects of the hurricanes. On November 1, the Championship Series opened with Christ Van Heek (*Flying Cloud*), Jay Nadelson (*All Clear*), and IYC PC Jim Nuzzo (*H2O*) taking first, second, and third, for the day based on total points and tiebreakers. In the IYC Intra-Club boat team competition, *FWB II* (Joe Hellner, Stephanie Green) took first.

Race Day #2 on November 15 could have used a bit more wind, but Jake Dye, Principal Race Officer (PRO), and the Race Committee did a fabulous job getting three races in with very mild yet shifty wind conditions! FWB II (Steven Lazar, Chris Taylor, Jim Tanner) won the day in the Intra-Club Series. Rob Sisk (Aude Man and the Sea) had a terrific day overall first place with two first places, and a third place. Bob Knowles (Dark and Stormy) was second for the day and Jim Nuzzo (H2O) was third. Congratulations to the Saturday winners!


There is a lot more action to come with three more race days before the holiday break and the Winter Series and several regattas ahead in the new year.



Wishing you the happiest of holidays that warm your heart in countless ways.


IYC WOMEN IN ACTION

NARCOTIC OVERDOSE AND THE USE OF NARCAN

While narcotic overdoses are more common on land than at sea, being prepared on the water is critical. A medical emergency offshore can quickly become life-threatening when professional help is miles away. Having Narcan (naloxone) aboard and knowing how to use it can save a life.

What Is Narcan?

Narcan is a safe, easy-to-use nasal spray that reverses the effects of opioid overdoses, including those caused by prescription painkillers, heroin, or fentanyl. It works by quickly blocking the opioids from attaching to receptors in the brain, restoring normal breathing within minutes.

Recognizing an Overdose

Common signs include unresponsiveness, slow or no breathing, pinpoint pupils, bluish lips or nails, and a weak pulse. If you suspect an overdose, act immediately - time is critical.

How to Use Narcan

- 1. Call for help or radio the Coast Guard.
- Lay the person on their back and ensure their airway is clear.
- 3. Insert the Narcan spray into one nostril and press the plunger firmly.
- 4. If there's no response in 2-3 minutes, use a second dose in the other nostril.
- 5. Begin rescue breathing or CPR if needed until help arrives.

Important Notes

Narcan is safe even if the person hasn't taken opioids, so when in doubt, use it. It's available without a prescription in most states and should be stored in a cool, dry place as part of every vessel's first-aid kit. After use, medical evaluation is always required—Narcan's effects wear off in 30-90 minutes, and overdose symptoms can return.

A Narcan safety box is located below the AED in the hallway by the bar at Isles Yacht Club. Knowing where it is - and how to use it - could save a life.






