FLEET CAPTAIN REPORT

Azure waters and temperate winds met an intrepid group of IYC cruisers for a week of sun, sand and island life while cruising the British Virgin Islands in the week before Thanksgiving. Ten power cats, loaded with sixty IYC members, family and friends embarked on a week-long cruise to places like "Bitter End", "Jost Van Dyke" and "Anegada." Each held a special charm with plenty to offer cruisers.

Our hosts, Marine Maxx Vacations, arranged and led the tour with a boat of their own. The flotilla included ten Aquilla 43' to 54' power cats equipped with three-four staterooms, each. These very maneuverable and comfortable boats are the perfect platform for cruising in the BVI's. Marinas are equipped to accommodate their broad beams and supply full services. For the occasional mooring ball stay there is an easy to use reservation system, and designated anchorages are well protected.

The trip started at Nanny Cay, on the island of Tortola with a hosted 'docktails' party. The second day saw a quick run to Norman Island with a snorkeling stop at "The Indians" and a visit to the famous Willy T's floating bar. Thence to Leverick Bay on the island of Virgin Gorda for a day of R&R.

The next day's trip to Anegada was the longest leg of the cruise but still clocked in at under about two hours. This island paradise offers the unique Moke (mini jeep) experience to get around the island. Tipsy's Bar offers unique and scrumptious island imbibements, such as the "Painkiller." Perhaps the finest day's adventure of the trip was the snorkeling experience at Conch Island, where sea turtles and sting rays were seen in abundance, while collecting the conchs which ultimately ended up providing an incredible ceviche. The lobster feast at Potters served up some of the best lobster, ever.

From Anegada, the cruise headed back to Bitter End on Virgin Gorda. The highlight of this visit was the fine dining at Saba Rock, a recently restored resort with fine al fresco dining.

The next day brought us to Scrub Island where a full service resort, marina and retail therapy were offered. The infinity pool, water slide and swim-up bar were favorites!

The final island visited was Jost Van Dyke, via Great Harbor anchorage. A short taxi ride deposited us at White's Bay, for a day at the famous Soggy Dollar beachfront bar.

All in all, the cruise was a wonderful opportunity to vacation in a tropical setting with the bulk of planning and support provided by our hosts. If interested in this experience, please watch for notices. Plans are already being made for a repeat cruise next November.



The Romans called upon Janus to mark new beginnings, seeing a strong start as key to success. Begin with clear goals and push past comfort zones to avoid stagnation.

As we enter the new year, our Club is well-positioned for progress through the strategic improvement plan that will help shape our future direction. We now have an opportunity to thoughtfully consider the best path forward.

In essence, Janus encourages one to stand at the crossroads and move ahead by combining what we've learned from previous experiences with a vision for the future. Happy New Year!





SAFETY COMMITTEE DR. JAMES MCCARTY

WHEN SHOULD YOU CALL 911?

Knowing when to call 911 can save a life - on land or on the water. At the Isles Yacht Club, safety is a shared responsibility, and quick action during an emergency can make all the difference. Here are clear guidelines to help you decide when a situation requires an immediate call to emergency services.

Call 911 right away if you witness any of the following:

A Medical Emergency

This includes chest pain, difficulty breathing, signs of stroke, severe bleeding, loss of consciousness, serious injuries from falls or boating accidents, or any situation where someone's condition is rapidly worsening.

Fire or Explosion Risk

If you see smoke, flames, or smell a strong burning odor - whether in the Clubhouse, marina, or on a vessel - call 911 immediately. Fire spreads quickly, especially around fuel sources.

A Crime in Progress or Threat to Safety

If you observe suspicious or dangerous behavior, theft, assault, or any situation that poses an immediate threat, contact 911 first, then notify Club management.

A Boating Emergency

Groundings with injuries, man-overboard situations, collisions, or vessels taking on water all require urgent attention. While VHF Channel 16 alerts the Coast Guard, calling 911 provides a direct local response, especially in inland waters.

If You're Unsure - Call

It's always better to err on the side of caution. Emergency dispatchers are trained to assess the situation and will send appropriate help. After calling 911, alert the Isles Yacht Club staff so they can assist first responders in reaching the location quickly.

Your preparedness saves time. Your call may save a life.

As Chair of the Planning Committee, I want to express my sincere appreciation to all past and present members of the Planning Committee, as well as those who served on the Special Building Committee. Your time, expertise, and dedication have been essential in developing the Campus Improvement Plan (CIP). I also thank the many Clubs' committees that contributed their input and perspectives, and the Board for its continued support and approval of the final CIP plan.

The CIP has been years in the making. Countless hours of analysis, discussion, and collaboration have gone into creating a plan that meets our Club's needs, provides the best use of our property, and modernizes our facilities for current and future members.


