Cruising the Intracoastal Waterway along the Gulf Coast of Florida offers a unique and scenic experience for boaters and nature enthusiasts alike. Stretching from the northern panhandle down to the southern tip of the state, the Intracoastal Waterway (ICW) offers a safe, protected route along the coastline, perfect for leisurely cruises, fishing trips, and visiting yacht clubs for a day or extended trip.

Starting in the northern part of the state, the ICW leads cruisers through the scenic waters of Pensacola and the Florida Panhandle. Here, the coastline is dotted with picturesque beaches and charming small towns. As you move southward, you'll encounter the bustling cities of Mobile Bay and the charming waterfront communities of Apalachicola and Port St. Joe, which offer fantastic dining and local attractions.

Continuing further south, the waterway takes you past the beautiful white-sand beaches of the Florida Big Bend and into the heart of the state's west coast. Crystal-clear waters and vibrant marine life make this area a favorite for sailors and anglers. Cities such as Clearwater, Sarasota, St. Petersburg, Fort Myers and Naples are prime stops along the route, with their lively downtown areas, thriving arts scenes, and gorgeous waterfront parks.

These islands are perfect for exploring by boat, offering secluded beaches and unique wildlife.

Whether you're an experienced cruiser or a novice, the ICW offers a memorable journey through one of Florida's most stunning regions. Our favorite ICW stop is St. Petersburg. What's yours?

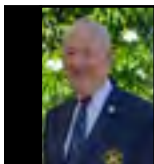

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

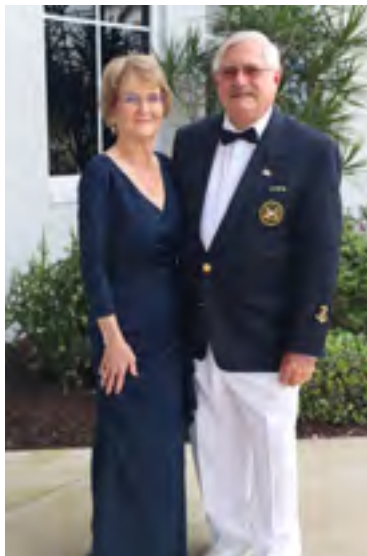

AHOY IYC SHIPMATES!

Did you know that IYC has three Harbor 20 sailboats that can be used by all members? They are kept at the Club, reserved online via the Club website, and are signed out at the Dockmasters Office. A member must be on the qualified skipper list to reserve and sign out a boat. The purpose of qualification is to ensure the member responsible for signing out the boat knows the Club and Safety rules, understands how to get the boat ready and to properly put it away for the next member, and how to sail and operate the boat including the electric motor.

For safety, the Club boats must have at least two people aboard and can have as many as four fit in the cockpit. Only one person needs to be qualified. Qualified members may take out family, other members, and guests.

Experienced sailors need only go out a few times on a Club boat to gain the knowledge needed to take one out on their own. For members new to sailing, crewing with a qualified member on an outing, in a social sailing event, or in one of our racing programs is a great way to learn. To get on the qualified list, designated Isles Sailing Club members such as our VP Michael Mixon will take you out on a check out sail, when you feel ready.

The IYC boat names are *Crafty Lady*, *FWB II*, and *Clipper*. In this, and future Sailing Club columns, we will tell the story of how IYC got involved with Harbor 20's, how the Club got their boats, and how the Club boats got their names. First up is *Crafty Lady*, which was the first Club boat acquired. It was purchased with 100% member donations through the Compass Fund. One of the primary donors, who happened to be Chair of the IYC Crafters, requested the boat be named as such. The boat you see today is not the original, which was severely damaged in a hurricane and replaced with the current *Crafty Lady*.

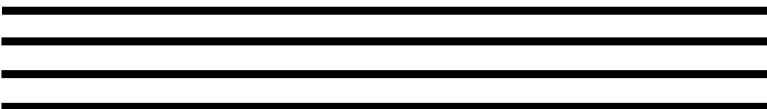

PLANNING COMMITTEE

DENNIS CANTWELL

I would like to extend my gratitude to Carol Nuzzo for her leadership as Chairperson of the Planning Committee during the previous Watch. I also appreciate her willingness to provide me, as the incoming Chair for the 2025-26 Planning Committee, advice and counsel as we move into the next Watch.

At the Annual Membership Meeting, the Planning Committee presented an update on the Campus Plan. For those who were unable to attend, or may have left early, the presentation is available on the IYC website. You can access it by navigating to **Member Central > Strategic Plan > Campus Plan**, where you will find the slide presentation with detailed information.

I would like to begin by addressing the purpose behind the Planning Committee's work on the Campus Plan.

The existing "modular" Bridge Building was installed more than twenty years ago following Hurricane Charley. The key question now is: **How much longer can the Bridge Building effectively serve the IYC needs, and at what cost?**

A report from Modular Genius, a company specializing in modular buildings, provides the following estimates for the average service life of modular building components:

- Interior Finishes: 5 to 10 years
- Roofing Systems: 20 years
- Mechanical Systems: 20 years
- Electrical and Plumbing Systems: 25 years
- Windows and Siding: 30 years
- Building Structure: 25 to 30 years
- Foundation: Forever

If we were to begin the Campus project today - assuming membership approval - the Bridge Building would be celebrating its 25th anniversary by the time of its removal. Based on these service life estimates, the question is not **does** the building need to be replaced, but **when**.

Four years ago, many members believed the current Bridge Building was sufficient. However, since then, the building is older and approximately 30% of our current membership is new, and 62% of the new members have expressed an interest in fitness activities (Gym, Pool, Fitness Classes). The proposed Activity Building and pool would provide improved fitness areas, along with space for additional activities, aligning with the high standards set by our existing Clubhouse.

Considering these factors, the Board directed the Planning Committee to develop a Campus Plan that reflects the needs and preferences of the membership. This plan will include a detailed timeline and cost analysis to ensure that, when the membership decides to move forward, the Board will be fully prepared to execute the project efficiently.

We appreciate your support and engagement as we continue this important planning process, while maintaining the original intent. I'm interested in hearing from you.

Understanding Sprains: Causes, Symptoms, and Treatment

A sprain is a common injury involving the stretching or tearing of ligaments, the tough bands of tissue that connect bones to one another. Sprains typically occur in the ankles, wrists, and knees due to sudden twists, falls, or impacts.

CAUSES

Sprains often result from:

- Falls: Landing awkwardly can twist a joint.
- Sports Injuries: Sudden movements, collisions, or overextension during activities like running, jumping, or tackling.
- Accidents: Slips, trips, and vehicular accidents can force joints into unnatural positions.

SYMPTOMS

The severity of a sprain can vary, but common symptoms include:

- Pain: Immediate, sharp pain at the injured site.
- Swelling: Caused by inflammation and fluid buildup.
- Bruising: Discoloration due to blood vessel damage.
- Limited Mobility: Difficulty moving the affected joint.
- Instability: Feeling of weakness or instability in the joint.

TREATMENT

Treatment of sprains follows the R.I.C.E. protocol:

1. Rest: Avoid activities that stress the injured joint.
2. Ice: Apply ice packs for 15-20 minutes every 2-3 hours to reduce swelling.
3. Compression: Use elastic bandages to wrap the joint, providing support and reducing swelling.
4. Elevation: Keep the injured limb elevated above heart level to minimize swelling.

For severe sprains, medical attention is necessary. A doctor may recommend:

- Physical Therapy: Exercises to strengthen the joint and restore mobility.
- Pain Relief: Over-the-counter pain medications or prescribed anti-inflammatory drugs.
- Immobilization: Using a brace or splint to stabilize the joint during recovery.

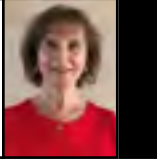
PREVENTION

Preventing sprains involves regular exercise to maintain strength and flexibility, proper warm-up before physical activities, and wearing appropriate footwear.

Understanding how to manage and prevent sprains can significantly aid in quick recovery and reduce the risk of future injuries.

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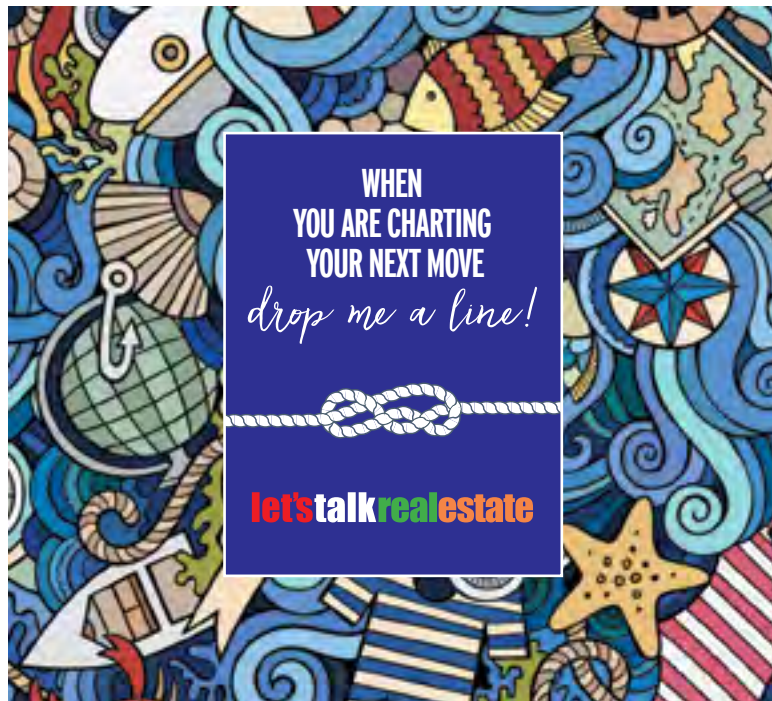
