At its most recent meeting, the House Committee continued its work on one of the Club's most important priorities: making everyday member experiences feel welcoming, consistent, and enjoyable. While special events often draw the most visible attention, much of the committee's discussion centered on the quieter details that shape how members experience the Club from week to week.

One encouraging theme was the continued positive response to food and beverage service. Members have noticed improvements in the quality and consistency of the dining experience, and the committee recognized the important role of the culinary and service teams in building that momentum. From fresher offerings to better execution in the kitchen, the goal remains simple: to provide meals and service that feel reliable, thoughtful, and worthy of the setting.

The committee also discussed ways to make dining at the Club more convenient and comfortable. Reservations continue to help the staff plan properly and maintain service standards, but the Club remains attentive to the reality that members may sometimes make last-minute dining decisions. The balance between flexibility and good service is an ongoing focus, especially as activity increases during the season.

Member feedback remains central to the committee's work. Comment cards and direct observations help identify what is working well and where improvements are still needed. Recent feedback has been encouraging, and the committee is committed to keeping that conversation active. Many of the improvements discussed at the meeting came directly from member comments or from committee members observing the Club experience firsthand.

Several behind-the-scenes enhancements are also moving forward. Updated staff uniforms, improved name tags, new check carriers, patio cushions, and other small but visible touches are all part of a broader effort to make the Club feel polished and attentive. Individually, these items may seem modest; together, they contribute to a more professional and welcoming atmosphere.

Service details were another important area of discussion. The committee reviewed ways to improve timing, attentiveness, and communication during dining and larger gatherings. Whether it is making sure food arrives hot, drinks are refilled promptly, or sound systems work smoothly, these operational details can have a meaningful impact on the member experience.

The committee also revisited the importance of helping newer members feel connected. As the Club continues to welcome new faces, creating natural opportunities for introductions and engagement remains a priority. A stronger ambassador-style effort may help new members become comfortable more quickly and build relationships across the membership.

Overall, the meeting reflected a practical and member-focused approach. The House Committee is not only looking at major improvements, but also at the everyday details that make the Club feel like home.

Florida Council of Yacht Clubs Updates

First, reciprocity at any of the 35 other FCYC clubs is one of the primary benefits afforded to our members. This can take the form of dockage, with first night free. And it can involve dining privileges at member clubs. With respect to dockage, many factors can affect the ability of slips, so it is best to call well in advance to make a transient reservation. Dinner reservations should also be made in advance, and please mention IYC/FCYC reciprocity when requesting a reservation. It has come to our attention that some clubs have multiple policies depending on the yacht club affiliation. That is, some clubs belong to multiple yachting organizations and have differing restrictions. With few exceptions, there should not be any dining restrictions for our members.

Second, FCYC has been very active with respect to the Bahamas cruising fees situation. Good news for the cruisers to the Bahamas. There is a new fee structure as of April 1, 2026 with almost a 50% decrease in fees to those cruisers that are primarily short term users. This change is due to the efforts by the Bahamas Marina Association and support from the FCYC.

To wrap things up, I would like to thank our very own Dr. Robert (Bob) Peterson, for taking on the enormous effort to organize FCYC inter-club sporting events. On Saturday, March 21, 2026, the Florida Council of Yacht Clubs (FCYC) hosted the 2025 FCYC Inter-club Pickleball Championship Tournament held at the Bradenton YC in Palmetto, Florida.

For those who understand the special bond between mariners and the water, few places in Florida offer the beauty, opportunity, and sense of tradition found in Charlotte Harbor and the Peace River. These historic waterways are far more than scenic landmarks; they are the heart of southwest Florida's boating, sailing and a supply of our drinking water.

Charlotte Harbor is one of Florida's largest and most impressive natural harbors, encompassing nearly 270 square miles of protected waters that open directly into the Gulf of Mexico. Its broad open reaches provide exhilarating sailing opportunities, while its protected anchorages and inland passages offer safe and enjoyable cruising throughout the year.

The harbor's prevailing breezes and expansive waters create excellent sailing conditions for both seasoned captains and those learning. Regattas, day sails, and leisurely sunset cruises are all part of the life style.

Beyond sailing, Charlotte Harbor offers endless opportunities for boating. Its many canals, dockside restaurants and day cruise

The Peace River is one of southwest Florida's most valuable natural resources, not only for its beauty and recreation but also for the essential role it plays in supplying drinking water to the region. Flowing more than 100 miles through central and southwest Florida, before emptying into Charlotte Harbor, the river serves as a critical freshwater source for thousands of residents and businesses.

For generations, the Peace River has supported Florida's communities by providing water for agriculture, industry, and public consumption. Today, it remains one of the primary surface water sources of drinking water for Charlotte, Sarasota, DeSoto, and surrounding counties.

For IYC members, Charlotte Harbor and the Peace River represent more than recreation. They embody the traditions of seamanship, fellowship, and stewardship that define club life. Dockside conversations, organized cruises, and friendly competition on race days strengthen the bonds between members and preserve the spirit of yachting.

These waters remind us why we gather at the IYC. Charlotte Harbor and the Peace River are not simply places to boat— they are the waters of the Isles Yacht Club.

I would like to take a moment to update our members on several important improvements and ongoing efforts around the marina.

First, I am pleased to report that all marina pedestals are now brand new and fully approved by the City. This has been a major project focused on improving both safety and reliability for our members and guests. We appreciate everyone's patience throughout the process and are proud to have completed this important upgrade.

In addition, we are expecting the arrival of our new current monitoring system. This equipment will allow us to closely monitor electrical current throughout the marina basin, helping us maintain a safer environment for all vessels and further enhancing our commitment to marina safety.

I also want to address questions regarding fuel pricing. The Isles Yacht Club works hard to provide competitive fuel prices for our members. We routinely obtain quotes from five different fuel suppliers and always purchase from the company offering the lowest available price at that time.

It is important to understand that comparisons to facilities such as Burnt Store are not always accurate. Large corporate-owned marinas and fuel operations have substantially greater buying power due to the volume they purchase, much like major gas station chains. As an independent club, we do our very best to negotiate the most favorable pricing possible while continuing to provide the level of service and quality our members expect.

Thank you for your continued support and understanding as we continue working to improve our marina and services.

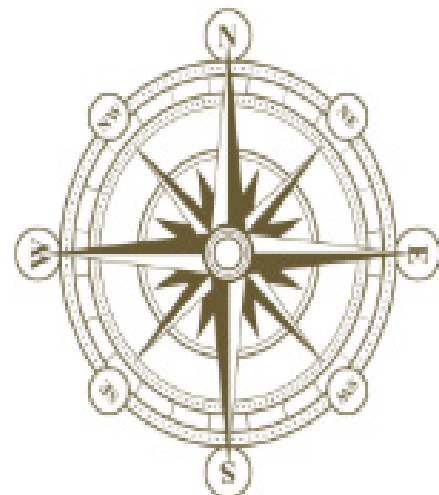
COMPASS FUND

Did you know that prior to **Hurricane Charlie in 2004**, **Finance Committee** member Ken Haun brought to the table the idea of establishing a fund where members could support their Club. During the expensive post hurricane rebuilding process there were financial shortfalls for “club enhancements” like chairs, dishware, art and much more which resulted in the establishment of the **Compass Fund**. (Thank you Jim Nuzzo for this historical background.) Since its inception, Club members have donated more than \$1.1 M toward our Club’s beautification. The next time you visit the Club, take a few minutes to peruse the **Compass Fund** book located under our recognition wall to see pictures of some past projects.

Recently, a **Compass Fund** initiative was established to assist in the purchasing of a new support boat for our Club’s water activities. To date, thirty-five members have donated to this worthy project. A wine list can feel like a test you didn't study for. Names you don't recognize, prices that jump around, and a table waiting for a decision. Most of us handle that moment the same way. We look for something familiar, or we let price do the deciding. There's nothing wrong with either approach. They're simply ways to simplify a long list when you're not sure where to start.

But there is another way—and it tends to be both more comfortable and more successful.

Wine lists aren't meant to be decoded so much as narrowed. You're not trying to identify the best bottle on the page. You're trying to find one that fits what's happening at your table.

That starts with the food. Not just what it is, but how it's prepared. A lighter dish generally pairs well with something lighter in the glass. Richer dishes can handle more weight, or something with enough acidity to keep things balanced. That one step alone tends to eliminate most of the list.

From there, think in terms of style rather than winery. Even if the names are unfamiliar, the general profiles are often predictable. Sauvignon Blanc is usually crisp and bright. Chardonnay can be fuller, sometimes with a bit of oak. Pinot Noir tends to be lighter and softer, while Cabernet brings more structure. Many Italian reds lean toward higher acidity and are especially food-friendly. You're not picking a brand—you're choosing a direction.

Once you're in the right category, price becomes more useful. If there are several options, the middle of the range is often a comfortable place to land. It tends to offer balance without asking too much from the moment. And if you're still deciding, a simple question goes a long way. "Something lighter," or "something that won't overpower this," is usually all it takes to get a thoughtful recommendation.

It doesn't have to be complicated. You're just looking for a wine that works for the meal, the table, and the evening.

Pro tip: when the bottle arrives, take a photo of it. If you picked a winner, you'll be glad to have the record.

Some wine dinners are memorable because of a particular bottle. Others stand out because the entire evening seems to work from the very first course. May's Wine & Dine, Barcelona, was one of those evenings.

Chef Robert Saalfeld and his team continue to raise the bar with menus that are both creative and approachable. This month's Spanish-inspired dinner took us from garlic shrimp and chorizo to grilled octopus, Iberico pork, lamb medallions, and a classic Crema Catalana. Every dish was beautifully prepared, and the portions were exactly right—enough to satisfy, but paced so that each course was anticipated rather than endured.

My favorite pairing came at the very beginning. The gambas al ajillo con chorizo was excellent on its own, but it truly came alive with the La Caña Albariño. Crisp and refreshing, the wine cut through the garlic and richness and seemed perfectly suited to the dish. It was one of those combinations where the food and wine were both good separately, but better together.

The second wine, a Godello, struck me as gentle and understated. The Priorat that followed was darker and more savory, with a robust character that reminded me somewhat of Syrah. The final red, a Muga Rioja Reserva, was fruit-forward and paired nicely with the lamb medallions in tomato broth.

And then there was dessert. Crema Catalana is Spain's answer to crème brûlée, and it was a fitting end to an evening that managed to feel both elegant and relaxed.

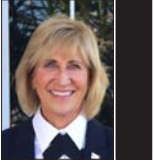

SAFETY COMMITTEE

At the Isles Yacht Club, we’re used to handling the unexpected—on the water and ashore. But few surprises are as immediate and memorable as stepping onto a mound of Florida fire ants.

The moment it happens, you’ll feel a sudden flurry of sharp stings, often before you even realize what you’ve disturbed. The first rule is simple: move quickly. Step off the mound right away to stop additional ants from climbing onto your legs. Fire ants latch on and sting repeatedly, so speed matters.

Next, brush them off—don’t slap wildly, as that can crush them and release more irritants. Use your hands or clothing to sweep them away firmly. Once clear, check your skin carefully; they tend to hide in socks, cuffs, and seams.

As soon as possible, wash the affected area with soap and water. This helps reduce the risk of infection and removes any remaining venom. Applying a cold compress can ease the burning sensation and reduce swelling. Over-the-counter remedies like hydrocortisone cream or antihistamines can also help relieve itching and discomfort.

For most people, the stings will form small, itchy pustules that heal within a few days. However, if you experience severe swelling, dizziness, or difficulty breathing, seek medical attention immediately—these could be signs of an allergic reaction.

Like many aspects of life in Florida, awareness and quick action make all the difference. Whether you’re tending lines, enjoying the grounds, or simply walking to the dock, keeping an eye out for those sandy mounds ensures your time at the club stays as pleasant as the breeze off the harbor.

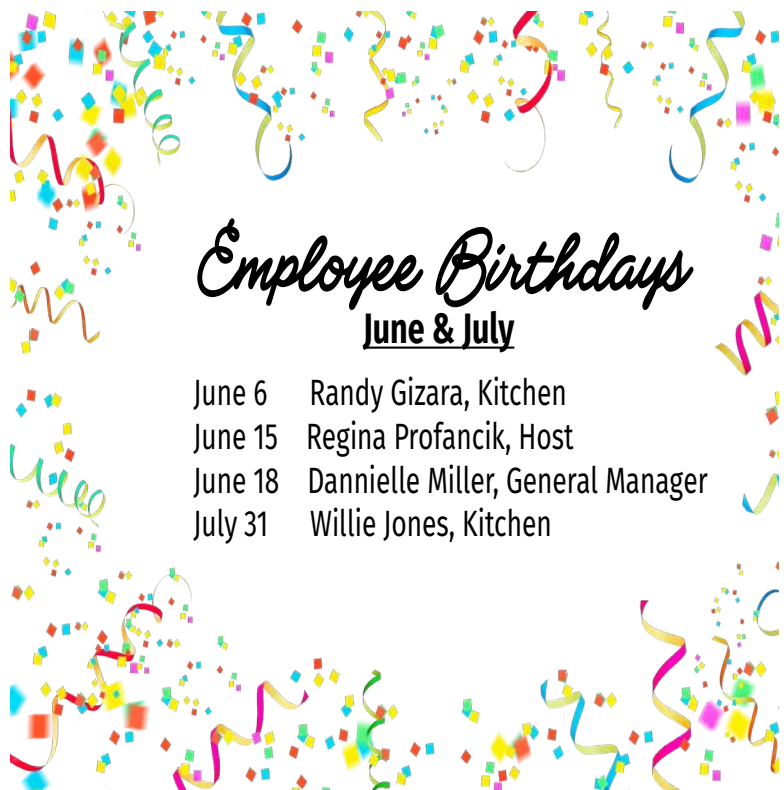


SETTING THE SCENE

Summer is here, and it's time for grilling! I have a new smoker on the way and cannot wait to put it to good use this summer. If you are visiting the Club and smell the smoker cooking some delicious meats stop by and see what we have on the grill.

This Summer will be busy for me.

Training will be the focus to get the staff ready to raise the bar for next season.

As always, we will be pushing the limit of what exciting, tasteful recipes we can share with you.

I look forward to seeing you all and cooking some great smoked meat and seafood for you to try!

Below is a recipe for my ***Coffee Rubbed Dr Pepper Smoked Beef Brisket***

- 3 Tbsp Kosher
- 3 Tbsp Chili Power
- 3 Tbsp garlic powder
- 3 Tbsp Black Pepper
- 3 Tbsp Granulated Onion
- 1 Tbsp Cumin
- ½ Tbsp Ground Mustard
- 2 Cups of Good Quality Coffee
- 1 2L Bottle Dr Pepper

Soak Brisket in Dr Pepper overnight, Pat with dry Cloth, Mix all spices and season Brisket thoroughly.

Cook at 250 degrees for 10-12 hours until fork-tender.

Baste with the Dr. Pepper while cooking.

For added flavor, you can also cook in the smoker with Hickory, Cherry, or Pecan Wood.

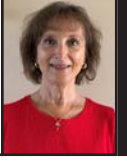
